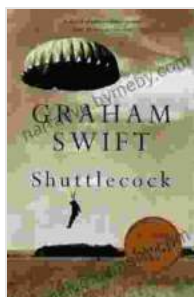


Shuttlecock: A Haunting Tale of Love, Loss, and the Fragility of Life

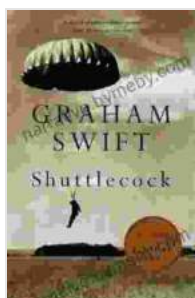
